 - (1) The skin used to cover them provided a batter covering that would provide the physical protection necessary for their bodies.
 - (2) The shedding of blood by killing animals to provide clothing speaks of the only way of covering man's shame and guilt (Luke 22:20; Rom. 5:9).
 - (3) Only God can forgive man's sin and remove it from His sight (Psa. 32:1, 5).
 - (4) Without the shedding of blood is no remission of sin (Heb. 9:22)

The East Jordan Tribes were Reuben, Gad, and half the tribe of Manasseh. They were so referred to because they had their inheritance on the east side of Jordan Page 13

18. Answer:

- (a) In his statement, "This is what your fathers did..." (Num. 32:8), Moses was referring to the lack of faith in God displayed by the spies who returned from their observation tour of Canaan (Num. 13 and 14).
- (b) Joshua and Caleb are noteworthy (Num 32:12) because of their unshakeable faith in God's willingness and ability to give victory over the enemies in Canaan (Num. 14:6-10).

19. Answer:

Moses caution the tribes of Reuben, Gad and the half tribe of Manasseh, noting that their promise was made to God and if they violated the agreement they would experience the consequences (Num 32:23)

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20. Answer:

- (a) They would leave their families, cattle and all livestock on the east side of Jordan.

- (a) The officers' pledge was one of loyalty and allegiance, a pledge that boosted Joshua's confidence in his call and ability to lead the people.
- (b) Such was important because it showed the unity committed by the leaders which would be a major contribution to the military campaign ahead. Page 17

They realized that Moses' exemplary leadership and lifestyle, his endurance under so many adverse circumstances and exploits were all possible because of the abiding presence of God (Ex. 33:14) and prayed that Joshua would experience the same. For more information see Pages 17-18

25. Answer:

- (a) Anyone who disobeys Joshua's orders would be executed. They would accept nothing but total and absolute commitment to obey the orders of Joshua.
- (b) This rule was regarded as absolutely necessary in entering Canaan and combating the enemies. In times of war the severity of military discipline is more necessary than at other times.

26. Answer:

- (a) The officers encouraged Joshua to be strong and courageous.
- (b) These words of encouragement were repeated to Joshua on three occasions:
 - (1) When Moses addressed Israel (Deut. 31, NB Vv. 7-13).
 - (2) When God commissioned Joshua to take people to the Promise Land, the charge was repeated three times (Josh. 1:6, 7. 9).
 - (3) By the officers when they pledge their loyalty (Josh. 1:18).
