- (b) The significant lesson taught is that God's presence and guidance were evident in the conquest of Jericho. Victory was achieved solely through His presence and guidance.

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12. Answer:

- (a) The result of Israel's obedience to God's directives in conquering Jericho was overwhelming victory.
- (b) If Israel had disobeyed, they would have been defeated and driven out of the Promised Land. Page 10

Some insights that the Canaanites in Jericho could have gained from Israel's processions around their city are:

15. Answer:

The rapture of the Church (Universal) will definitely take place. The word: rapture" is not used in the Bible but its reality taught, for example in 1 Thess. 4:13-18, NB Vv. 16-17. The word rapture means "caught away" or "caught up." The "shout" we are referring to is as noted in 1 Thess. 4:16; see also John 14:1-3; etc. See Pages 12 -13.

16. Answer:

This world will be judged, and we are not without adequate warning and opportunities to amend our ways (Jer. 7:3, 5; 26:13; 35:15). Despite God's wooing and His outstretched arms and grace many are on a complete "lock-down", well secured in their own ways, just like Jericho.

- (a) "Accursed" as used in Josh. 6:17, 18, is derived from the Hebrew "cherem" which means "to separate for destruction or to put under a ban." It is also translated "to destroy or devote."
- (b) The city of Jericho by the decree of God was doomed tor total destruction and the precious metal and stones were to be dedicate to the Tabernacle of God.
- (c) Rahab and her family would be saved in return for her act of kindness to the two spies.

- (a) Before Israel entered the Promised Land, God gave strict instructions to completely destroy these nations (Deut. 20:16-17; compare with Num. 33:51-53).

Rahab and her family were placed outside the camp of Israel until they were ceremonially and ritually cleansed (Num. 5:1-4; 12:3-16; Deut. 23:9-14; etc.) Pages 28-29

23. Answer:

The illustration is based on using a slave market . . . slavery is used as a symbol of the bondage of sin. Jesus Christ the Redeemer purchased our salvation thus securing our liberty (1 Peter 1:18-19: etc.)

- (a) We were **purchased in** the slave market.
- (b) We were taken out of the slave market.
- (c) We were set free!!

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25. Answer:

- (a) The curse meant Jericho was a doomed city, under the judgment of God because of the terrible evil that prevailed among its occupants. The curse meant that the city would remain in ruins and anyone who rebuilds the city would suffer the loss of his first- and last-born sons.
- (b) This curse was fulfilled as noted in 1 Kings 16:34 when a man, Hiel, rebuilt Jericho and consequently lost his oldest and youngest sons. Page 32
