The following is a brief presentation on 2 Cor. 4:4:

- (a) The “god of this world” refers to Satan (John 12:31; 14:30; 16:11; Eph. 2:2), who holds power over much of the activity of this present age.
- (b) His rule is, however, temporary and conditional. He continues only by God’s permissive will until the end of history (Rev. 19:11-20:10).
- (c) Those who do not submit themselves to Jesus Christ remain under Satan’s sway. He blinds their eyes to the truth and glory of the gospel in order that they might not be saved.
- (d) **The solution** to this fatal situation is to bind Satan’s activity through intercession and to preach the gospel in the power of the Spirit (Acts 1:8) in order that people may hear, understand and choose to believe and be saved (2 Cor. 4:5-6).

9. **Answer:**

This was a final effort by the enemy to do whatever in order to stop Israel from entering the Promised Land.

24. **Answer:**

**Hardened Hearts (Josh. 11:20a)**

Such condition was the result of their obstinacy and continued outright rejection of God . . . this is what hardens their hearts. Their hearts became harder and harder and they became more and more stubborn. Their hearts grew beyond repentance, beyond any hope of repentance.

25. **Answer:**

- (a) The name "Anakim" is said to mean "long neck" meaning "tall." The Hebrews thought them to be descendants of the Nephilim, a powerful race who dominated the pre-flood world (Ge. 6:4; Num. 13:33), according to the Old Testament.
- (b) Anakims were described as a race of giants and warlike people (Deut. 2:10, 11, 21; 9:2), according to the Old Testament).

**26. Answer:**

- (a) False
- (b) Explanation is as follows:
  - (1) Joshua totally destroyed the Anakims **within the Promised Land**. There were no giants, no large enemies left to combat God's people **within the Promised Land**.
  - (2) There were giants, large enemies, only in other nations outside of the Promised Land.

**27. Answer:**

- (a) The area east of Jordan was controlled by two kings, Sihon king of the Amorites and Og king of Bashan, before Israel's occupation.
- (b) Sihon king of the Amorite had refused to grant permission to Israel to pass through his territory and was eventually conquered (Num. 21:21-23).
- (c) Og king of Bashan is believed to have come from the giant race of Rephaim (Deut. 3:11).

**28. Answer:**

- (a) There were various kinds of lands within Canaan which contributed to its pleasantness and its fruitfulness.
- (b) The mountains were not rough, rocky and barren.
- (c) The valleys were not mossy and swampy but covered with grains.
- (d) The plains were blessed with springs of water, along with magnificent primeval forest, graced with towns and houses.

**29. Answer:**

- (a) Those who were entering Canaan were uniquely God's people, and they were entering into that which had been promised (Gen. 15:18-21; etc.).
