# SELECTED PSALMS PHASE 1 PSALM 15 Answers for Review Questions

## 1. Answer:

- (a) It is believed that Psalm 15 was written when David transferred the Ark of God to Jerusalem (2 Sam. 6).
- (b) Psalm 15 presents a close resemblance with Psalm 24, which was written when the Ark of God was taken to Jerusalem.

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#### 3. Answer:

- (a) *"Abide"* or *"sojourn"* is used reflectively (deliberately, meditative, etc.) with meaning to seek hospitality within (1 Kings 17:20).
- (b) The idea conveyed for *"abide"* as used in our text is to *"sojourn;"* that is to abide in a place as a sojourner or a stranger; not permanently.

## 5. Answer:

- (a) Without God in our lives nothing is worthwhile, but with Him, everything can have meaning, purpose and effectiveness.
- (b) Some benefits derived as a result of the presence of God are:
  - (1) When we live in fellowship with God we are guaranteed the fullness of joy (Psa. 16:11).
  - (2) By dwelling in the presence of God we are brought under His ultimate protection . . . continuously (Psa. 91:1; 121).

## 6. Answer:

*"Abide"* or *"sojourn"* (Psa. 15:1), is to abide in a place as a sojourner, which speaks of a temporary situation. *"Dwell"* (Psa. 15:1) is used in a more permanent sense than the word *"abide"*; it refers to having permanent status. For more information, see Pages 7-8 & 9-10.

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# 7. Answer:

David's thoughts were fully focused on his daily walk with God, living with a watchful awareness of God's holy presence. We must not only talk the talk but walk the walk; we have a life to live and a God to glorify, we are to walk worthy of our calling (Eph. 4:1). Page 10

## 8. Answer:

- (a) *"He who walks uprightly"* is the same concept used in Gen. 17:1 . . . *"... walk before Me and be blameless"* . . . the charge to walk before **God** in complete, unconditional surrender.
- (b) It includes whole-hearted devotion to God, and complete integrity in dealing with men.

#### 11. Answer:

- (a) The word "backbite" means to consume, slander, reproach; speak evil of. Based on the Hebrew usage it is associated with the verb form derived from the word foot, in essence it means to foot it, and then to go about. Other terms used to describe backbite are: slander or tale-bearer.
- (b) The *backbiter* goes about as a tale-bearer or slanderer; to spread unfavorable reports of others.
