SELECTED PSALMS PHASE 2 PSALM 47 Answers for Review Questions

1. Answer:

Psalm 47 is classified as a Messianic Psalm because it prophetically refers to Jesus Christ; for example, verse 5 is associated with Christ's ascension. (Acts 1:1-11) Etc. Page 4

2. Answer:

Item (d) . . . ". . . here is a jubilant celebration of God's . . ." Page 5

3. Answer:

Worship is regarded as the most fundamental function of being a Christian. Worship means that God is acknowledged and celebrated; His power and protection with a depth of sincere gratitude.

Some significant facts associated with the phrase: "LORD Most High", are:

- (a) It speaks of the sovereignty of God; He alone is the LORD God Almighty!
- (b) It is associated with *Yahweh* . . . He is exalted above all other beings (Ex. 18:11; 1 Chron. 16:25; etc.).

6. Answer:

Some associated facts with: "He is a great King over all the earth", (Psa. 47:2) are:

(a) Awe-inspiring Power

The phrase *"great King"* conveys the majesty and might of God, inspiring a sense of reverence and fear (not terror) towards His power.

(b) Contrast to Human Kings

By declaring God as the *"great King over all the earth,"* the verse contrasts Him with earthly rulers who have limited power and domain.

He will conquer the enemies and assuring His people of victory. Victory comes not through our own efforts but through God's activity on our behalf (Psa. 44:6; etc.).

9. Answer:

"The excellence of Jacob . . ." (Psa. 47:4b) as used in this verse, refers to the Land of Canaan.

10. Answer:

- (a) Some thoughts in regards to what is really taught in Psa. 47:5, are:
 - (1) The Carrying of the Ark to Jerusalem

The Ark of the Covenant was a symbol of God's presence and carrying it to Jerusalem was a solemn event that involved dancing, trumpets and shouts (2 Sam. 2:12-23).

(2) The Ascension of Jesus

The verse can be interpreted as a reference to Jesus' ascension into heaven, when He finished His work on earth. The shout of a king or conqueror can be applied to this event.

The sound of a trumpet (referring to the period of our text) was evidence of victory, and shows that the victory was to be traced solely to God.
